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Preface

Agricultural districts were first formed in New York in 1972. In the ensuing eleven years districts continued to be formed and at the same time legally mandated reviews were carried out on districts after being in existence for eight years.

This paper resulted from a need to follow the course of some districts as they proceeded through the eight-year review process. During this process some districts retained their original configurations while others changed. Some districts were modified in such a manner that they lost acreage while other districts added acreage.

In order to determine the net effects that modifications had on districts, a study was carried out on all districts created through March 1983 and all districts that were reviewed up until that time.

Official records from New York State agencies, county records and communications with county planners, Extension agents, as well as agency personnel, provided the data contained in this report.

Special thanks are due Nancy Brinthaup for not only studying the official records and documenting both the creation and review of the districts, but also her special skills in preparing the tables and typing the manuscript.

The author assumes responsibility for any shortcomings or oversights in the final draft of this paper.

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New York's Agricultural District Law was enacted and became effective on September 15, 1971. The purpose of the law was..."to provide a means by which agricultural land may be protected and enhanced as a viable segment of the state's economy and as an economic and environmental resource of major importance," to the state.¹

Districts created under the provisions of the law are established for a period of eight years. At the end of the eight-year period, districts are reviewed to determine their future status.

This report is intended to provide the reader with a summary of:

- a) the number, acreage and year that individual districts were formed by counties under the provisions of the Agricultural District Law;
- b) the number, acreage and year of district eight-year reviews carried out by counties under the provisions of the Agricultural District Law.

Individual Districts Formed

As of March 1983, 456 individual districts were formed or certified for formation in 49 counties of New York State. These districts comprise about 6,741,000 acres. Table 1. shows the number and acres of districts originally formed or certified for formation from 1972 through March 1983. Revisions have been made in Table 1. to account for incorrect acreages originally reported when districts were formed and discovered at the time of eight-year reviews.

Districts range in size from 535 acres (Allegany County) to 243,340 acres (St. Lawrence County). The average size of districts before the eight-year review process was initiated was 14,782 acres.

Figure 1. shows the cumulative growth in the number of districts and districted land for the period from 1972 to 1983. Efforts to create districts still continues, but has moderated substantially since the mid-1970's when more than one million acres were added to the program each year.

As the full eight-year term of certain districts has occurred, 43 of New York's participating counties have been notified by the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets that some districts within their county are eligible for the eight-year review. Counties are required to review districts and to hold public hearings on each district prior to the eighth anniversary.

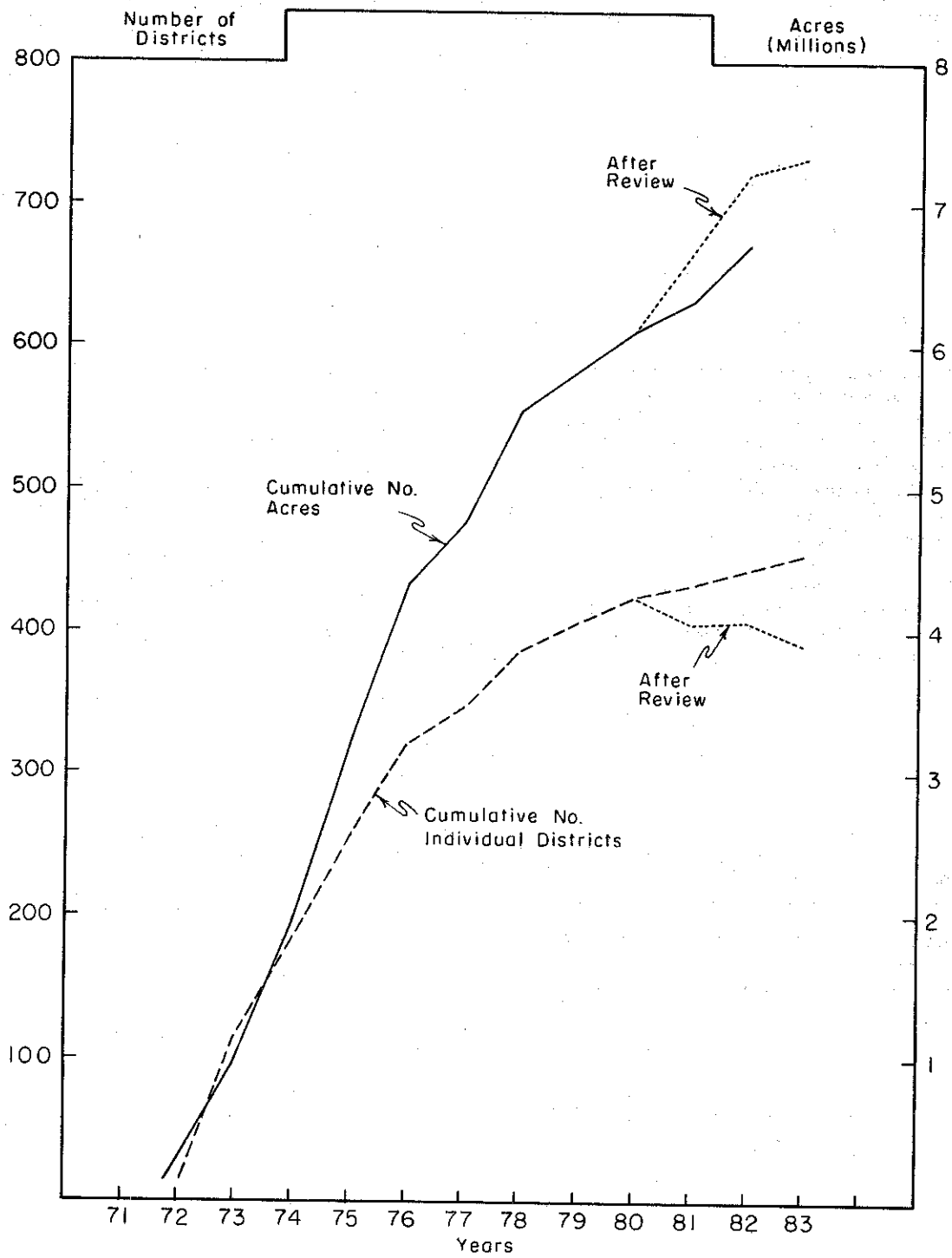

Eight-Year Reviews

A principal purpose of the eight-year review is to provide the opportunity for counties and state agencies to re-examine the original districts and to determine whether or not any changes that have taken place during the past eight years warrant modifying the boundaries of the districts. Counties can exercise the following options with regard to boundary decisions at the time of the eight-year review:

- a) Retain the original district boundaries.
- b) Remove land no longer considered viable agricultural land.
- c) Add viable farmland not previously included in the district.
- d) Combine parts or whole districts.
- e) Discontinue the district completely.

As of March 1983, one-hundred ninety-five (195) districts have undergone the eight-year review. An additional sixty (60) districts are in the review process. As a result of consolidations of districts during the review process, the original 195 districts were reformed into 129 districts. Thirty-five (35) districts were maintained in their original configurations. Twenty-four (24) districts lost acreage and were consolidated into 13 smaller districts. One-hundred thirty-six (136) districts were enlarged by adding either new lands or by consolidating previously established districts and were combined into eighty-one (81) districts.

Table 2. summarizes the results of the eight-year review of the 195 districts. The number, acres and average size of districts both before and after review is shown. While the number of districts declined from 195 to 129, the amount of land increased by 589,345 acres. The average size of districts increased from 10,384 before review to 20,266 acres after review.

The changes in the number and size class distribution that resulted from the eight-year review is shown in Table 3. The consolidation of districts resulted in fewer small districts and more large ones.

No districts were terminated at the time of the review.

Table 4. shows the counties that retained district boundaries at the time the districts were reviewed. A total of 355,080 acres in thirty-five (35) separate districts were maintained in the original configuration. The average size of these districts is 10,145 acres with a range of 712 to 58,146 acres.

Twenty-four (24) districts comprising 287,043 acres lost acreage as a result of the eight-year review process. The average size of these twenty-four districts before review was 11,960 acres; after review the average size dropped to 10,658 acres or an average loss of about 1,302 acres per district. Table 5. shows the counties and distribution by size class of these districts.

One-hundred thirty-six (136) districts increased in size as a result of the review process. The increase in acreage of these 136 districts resulted from modifications by either adding new lands not previously included in districts or by consolidating other acreage included in established districts or by a combination of both.

As a result of the consolidation of districts during the review process, the 136 districts were reformed into 81 districts. The acreage increased from 1,382,918 to 2,003,513 or an increase of 620,595 acres.

The average size of these districts increased from 10,168 to 24,734 acres -- a nearly two and one half times increase. Table 6. summarizes the results of the 136 districts that increased in size. Special note should be made of the major consolidations that occurred in Orange County where twenty-three districts were combined into two districts after review.

Cayuga, Cortland, Oneida, Seneca, Tioga, Livingston, Sullivan, Chenango, Niagara and Delaware counties also added significant acreage to districts when they were reviewed.

Summary

New York counties continue to create new agricultural districts while at the same time the process of conducting eight-year reviews is also moving forward.

Over the past eleven years a total of 456 districts were established comprising 6,740,716 acres in 49 counties.

At the same time, 195 districts established over eight years ago have been reviewed. After taking into account deletions, additions and consolidation of lands at the time of review, the total number of districts dropped from 456 to 390. However, the acreage increased from 6,740,716 to 7,330,061. The result of the review process has been that the statewide average size of all districts has increased to 18,795 acres.
